

NOTE: PACKETS WILL BE MAILED IN JULY TO CLUB LEADERS

It's that time of year again... **ANNUAL FINANCIAL REPORT TIME!** We realize that this time of year is a bit crazy. Thank you ahead of time for completing these important reports!

What is due when?

Chartered Clubs/Groups with bank accounts are required to complete the report. Deadlines are **extremely important** because it could affect the status of your club charter if reports are late. We would greatly appreciate that your forms meet deadline so that we have time to look the reports over and contact you if there is any missing info or corrections before uploading them to the state portal.

REPORTS DUE SEPTEMBER 1ST TO THE EXTENSION OFFICE

The completed report with supporting documents include:

- Completed Wisconsin 4-H Clubs & Groups Annual Financial Report with all signatures.
- Completed 4-H Club Audit Checklist
- Copy of the checkbook and/or savings registry covering July 1, 2022 June 30, 2023
- Copy of the bank statement ending June 30 or July 1, 2023 for each account.
 Any differences between the bank statement(s) and the ending balance
 reported must be reconciled and notated either on the report or a separate sheet.
- Current inventory of land, buildings, property or project equipment with individual values of \$2,000 or more (if applicable).
- Monthly Treasurer's Reports for 4-H Clubs or Groups with annual income greater or equal to \$20,000 (if applicable).

Club Audit: You will need to have **two** adults, unrelated to the club treasurer or club leader complete the audit, complete the checklist and sign the Annual Financial Report. Please do not wait until the last minute to have these audits completed. Allow enough time for two people to complete the audit. The club leader and treasurer should be present.

- 1. Pullorum testing must be done for all poultry which includes ducks, chickens, geese, all game birds and guinea fowl. Pigeons do not have to tested. Fair rules state all birds must be tested by July 15th. Please contact Juanene Johnson 9203583537 to set up testing times and ask her about the fees associated with testing your birds. You will need to be the original and a paper copy of your testing papers that I can keep at the fairgrounds.
- 2. You can find complete rules and regulations, code of ethics in the junior fair barn animal premium book and in the Junior rules and judging times premium book
- 3. Please make sure you have a premises ID number. You will need that to have your birds tested. It is required by Wisconsin state law.







Space Camp

Have you ever been interested in Space, well Space Camp may be a 4-H experience you'd enjoy. Hello, my name is Evan Numirch and I was able to go to Space Camp this year April 20th to April 24th, 2023. This trip is for 6th to 9th graders.

We had to travel to Alabama which was a good experience to make new friends from different counties around Wisconsin. We traveled on 1 of 4 coach buses. We stayed in a hotel overnight and once we got there we started activities right away. There were SO many activities I will do my best to list them all. There was a museum



where we had a scavenger hunt where there was a rock from the moon, 2 different simulators, and a rocket that was hanging on the ceiling that got launched into the air. It was a test rocket that never went to space.



Then there were 3 presentations about many space things.
