ADULT VOLUNTEERS

Volunteer Types:

If you would like to be affiliated with a specific 4-H club or group, you MUST select CLUB VOLUNTEER. From there, you can select which type of club volunteer suits you best.

If you plan to be an overnight chaperone, you MUST choose **PROGRAM VOLUNTEER** and then choose **Overnight Adult Advisor / Chaperone**

If you are a project leader and want to be affiliated with a specific club, you MUST select CLUB VOLUNTEER and then select Club Project Leader

If you are a project leader and **do not** want to be affiliated with a club, select **PROJECT VOLUNTEER**. From there, you can select which type suits you best

Approving Adult Volunteers:

After the 4-H Program Coordinator (Dana) has approved an adult volunteer, a Volunteer Agreement letter will be emailed to the volunteer from the State Office. This letter will confirm the volunteer role(s) and will provide a link to the appropriate volunteer role description.

PLEASE NOTE: The content of the Volunteer Agreement Letter outlines the dates that volunteer is covered by liability insurance and essentially serves as a contract between the volunteer and Extension.

RE-ENROLLMENT

Training Requirements for Staff & Volunteers

Many of the volunteer training requirements also apply to staff. Here's a breakdown of what is required, by who and where to locate information on the training:

Required by UW Policy 301 and Governor's Executive Order EO 54

Required at start of volunteer service, taken through 4H Online, no refresher required.

Sexual Misconduct & Clery Crimes/Responsible Employee (Title IX)

Required by UW-Madison Office of Youth Protection and Compliance (OYPC). Available for staff and volunteers at https://youthtraining.compliance.wisc.edu/

Required by all PYD staff every year due as "Responsible Employees" Volunteers who work with youth are required to take Section 1 & 2 (timing requirement is being discussed - TBA)

Volunteers

Building Safe Spaces

Required by UW-Madison Division of Extension - in Vulnerable Populations Handbook Training and more information available at: http://buildingsafespaceswi4horg

Staff

Required by all PYD staff who lead youth programs or supervise volunteers who work with youth - take initial training and participate in refreshers every 2 years. Volunteers Volunteers who work with youth are required to take initial training, and then participate in refreshers every 2 years

Supporting Youth Mental Health

Required by UW-Madison Division of Extension - in Vulnerable Populations Handbook Training and more information available at: http://symh.wi4h.org

Required by all PYD staff who may be serving in custodial care roles. Initial training taken once, then refreshers every 2 years.

Staff

Volunteers who serve as overnight chaperones/adult advisors or custodial care roles are required to take the complete training once, then refreshers every 2 years

Volunteers

Volunteers in Preparation (VIP) Orientation

Required by UW-Madison Division of Extension - offered in-person or by Zoom in local counties (and occasionally regionally or statewide)

Staff

Volunteers

Staff who supervise volunteers should participate in a VIP training to shadow the process and learn to facilitate. Staff resources for VIP are available at

Exploring 4-H for New Families

4-H Projects

4-H engages youth in project-based education. Through project learning, youth can dive deeper into their interests and passions, ultimately mastering new skills. 4-H projects are meant to be hands-on to create a memorable learning experience.

What is a project?

A project is simply a topic area that **sparks** a youth's interest! Projects can be offered at a club or group setting, or on your own outside of the club. 4-H members are encouraged to enroll in only one or two projects for their first year. 4-H members in 3rd grade and higher are eligible to sign up for any 4-H project. Almost all 4-H projects can be divided into these nine broad project areas:

- Animal Sciences
- Arts & Communication
- · Community Involvement
- · Family, Home, & Health
- Outdoor Education (Natural Sciences)
- Cultural Projects
- Plant & Soil Sciences
- Extension and Outreach • Start Your Own

WA STATE UNIVERSITY

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A tenth project area is specifically for grades K-2, known as **Cloverbuds**. It is intended to be more developmentally appropriate for our youngest members.

What resources are available?

Each county's 4-H program differs in how project learning opportunities are offered. Some programs offer countywide, short-term workshops. Others may have countywide programs with set dates and meeting locations. Some 4-H clubs may have adults specifically devoted to certain project areas.

STEM

What if my county or club doesn't offer a project?

Anywhere can a great place for project learning where a trusted adult or older youth serves as the teacher. Project curriculum is available for many of the projects from <u>shop4-h.org</u> or your local Extension office.

What is a project leader?

Project leaders provide a safe environment to learn about a project area in which they have experience. Adults can volunteer as a project leader to share their specialized skill set with youth!



Reports of fraud have increased over recent years as scammers used the pandemic to come up with new ways to trick people into sharing their financial information. These pandemic-related scams are in addition to already existing scams, such as threatening someone with arrest by saying they owe taxes or demanding payment on an overdue loan through a wire transfer or paying the scammer using a gift card.

Monitoring your own credit report is one way to keep an eye out for signs of fraud or identity theft. Because of the pandemic, consumers can currently order a free weekly credit report online through December 31, 2023. You can request the weekly reports from <u>https://www.annualcreditreport.com/index.action</u> —one each from the three credit bureaus: Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion. While the free weekly credit reports are only available online, consumers can also order free annual credit reports through the mail using the official request form found online or by phone toll free at 877-322-8228.

In addition to email reminders and links to credit resources, Extension provides information on this financial website for ordering, reading, and understanding your free credit reports. <u>https://finances.extension.wisc.edu/article-topic/building-and-maintaining-credit/</u> You can also find out how to place a free credit freeze or fraud alert on your credit reports and whether that's the right decision for you.
