It's good - It's in season - It's local

This month FoodWlse is highlighting Cabbage! Stop by the Extension Office for more materials and recipes.



Select - Choose cabbage heads with compact leaves.

Store - Tightly wrap in plastic and refrigerate for up to 7 days.

Prepare – Carefully run a small knife around the core to remove it. Slice or chop the leaves.



Cabbage is the Harvest of the Month!

Add cabbage to your favorite family meals:

- Add cabbage to your favorite veggie soup, stew, or stir fry.
- Use cabbage leaves as a tortilla or wrap.
- Add raw cabbage to salad.

Make meals and memories together. It's a lesson kids will use for life.

Did you know?

Green and red cabbage are the most common, but other types of cabbage include Napa (Chinese cabbage) and Savoy.

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

How Early is Too Early to Begin New Seeding Alfalfa Plantings?

Farmers have already begun hauling manure, and spring tillage has commenced! The historicly mild temperatures in February are to thank for this early start. However, a survey of soil temperatures across North-East and East-Central Wisconsin fields



reveals lower than ideal values. So the question is: is it safe to start seeding new alfalfa?

Check out this article to find out!

The bottom line: I understand that, with the potential of drought-like conditions possible again in 2024, farmers want to get new seeding alfalfa planted early enough to catch April showers. But while germination is important, seedling survival is necessary. Ideally, plant alfalfa when the risk of 24* F or lower air temperatures will not adversely affect seedling survival.

Money Matters is an online program designed to improve your financial habits. Through this course, you will gain money management skills and build knowledge you can use to improve your finances. The course can be completed through online self-study only or online self-study with financial coaching

Money Matters includes 16 self-paced modules of personal financial learning. Topics covered include Explore Credit Scores and Credit Reports, Make a Spending Plan, Managing Student Loans, Money and Relationships, What is Credit and How to Build It, and Debt Management. Five modules have been translated into Spanish. After finishing each module, Wisconsin residents can receive a certificate of completion if you meet the requirements.

Participants can pair their **Money Matters** activities with one-on-one financial coaching with an Extension educator. Financial coaching is a unique approach for increasing individuals' financial capability, distinct from counseling, advising, or teaching. Our financial educators can help walk through ideas and options to create a budget, keep up with bills, pay down debt, plan for big
