We will be using SignUp Genius again to help register volunteers for shifts across the various days of the fair as well as a Dipper Prep and Clean date on Sunday, 7/28/2024 and a Dipper shutdown date on Monday, 8/5/2024.

Each 4-H Dipper shift will be 2 hours and should consist of 4 Adults/Older Youth (8th Grade and higher) and 4 younger youth (Cloverbuds through 7th grade). Responsibilities may vary depending on shift but we would prefer to have adults and older youth handle the cash box, scoop ice cream, make shakes and malts, and help supervise the team during the shift. Younger youth can serve drinks, take orders on the iPAD, and help put toppings on the sundaes.

The opening and closing shifts will have 30 minutes of time to handle the necessary tasks to either open the dipper in the morning or close down the dipper in the evening. You will see that time as part of the shift descriptions.

Clubs can sign up for shifts but we ask that the individuals that will be working the shift sign up for their times so we can learn names and know who is coming to help us work the shifts. Remember, the idea of the signups is to add flexibility to YOUR fair schedule. Pick times that will work for you and your family or you and your club and help us out! It is a great opportunity to meet other youth and adults from around the county you may not see on a regular basis.




Dog Project



- Swine/Sheep & Beef Check-ins at the Fair: In conjunction with the Meat Animal Board, we will again be doing ultrasounds of meat animals (instead of a carcass evaluation post-fair). In order to complete this in a safe and efficient manner, we are doing one species at a time for check-in. The biggest change is that All Swine must be on the grounds and checked in by 2:00pm!
- Here is the check-in schedule: Swine 12:00noon 2:00pm Sheep following Swine at approximately 3:00-4:00pm Beef following Sheep at approximately 5:00-6:00pm We'll say it one more time All Swine must be on the grounds and checked in by 2:00pm! Sheep and Beef may come early (anytime after 12:00noon) but will not be weighed until their check-in time (in other words, if you bring all animals at once, sheep and beef will be allowed to be put in pens prior to their weigh-in but SWINE have to be on grounds by 2:00pm. Please plan accordingly).
- FAIR ENTRY DEADLINE is TUESDAY, June 25 at 11:59PM. Fair Entry is not open yet, it will likely be late in May before it becomes available.

- Dip asparagus spears in a healthy dip or dressing.
- Use leftover cooked asparagus in your scrambled eggs.
- Add asparagus to roasted potatoes, rice side dishes, or pasta salad.

Did you know?

Asparagus can be found in three colors: green, white, and purple. White asparagus is grown under the soil, so it is never exposed to sunlight and never turns green.
