Better Safe Than Scary: How to Avoid Tricks in your Halloween Treats

Halloween is just around the corner, and food safety is key. Use the following tips to check your child's Halloween candy after trick-or-treating and avoid any scary surprises:

- Do not eat anything unless it is commercially wrapped.
- Inspect all candy wrappers for signs of tampering, such as tiny pinholes or tears in the wrapper.
- Discard spoiled, discolored, or unwrapped items.
- Throw away any homemade goods, unless you know the person who prepared them.
- Read nutrition labels to identify allergens and discard those pieces.
- Remove choking hazards for young children, such as hard candies, gum, and small toys.
