

- If you want to be an Overnight Chaperone, you MUST choose **PROGRAM VOLUNTEER** and then chose **Overnight Adult Advisor/Chaperone.**
- If you are a project leader and want to be affiliated with a specific club, you MUST select **CLUB VOLUNTEER** and then select Club Project Leader.
- If you are a project leader and you do not want to be affiliated with a specific club, you MUST select PROJECT VOLUNTEER. Then you can choose which type suits you best.

Trainings

Returning volunteers that have training and/or background check to complete: You will have a 90day grace period beginning on October 1, 2024 to complete any new or additional trainings and background check (if required) to remain an approved volunteer. These requirements must be completed prior to December 1st or your enrollment will be moved to Inactive Status.



Other Information

- If your club has multiple Co-Leaders a list of each Co-Leader's duties needs to be kept and copy needs to be sent to dana.berger@wisc.edu
- Approving Adult Volunteers: After the4-H program coordinator approves an adult volunteer, a Volunteer Agreement Letter will be emailed to the volunteer from the state office. The letter will confirm the volunteers role(s) and will provide a link to the appropriate volunteer description.
- The letter mentioned above will outline the dates that the volunteer is covered with liability insurance and will act as a contract between the volunteer and extension.





Are you a renter or a landlord? Do you understand the specific rights that each party has under Wisconsin rental codes and statutes? Common areas of misunderstanding include rental application fees and the legal eviction process.



Extension has created two fact sheets to aid tenants and landlords in understanding the legal limits and requirements concerning application fees and eviction notices. You can find both document on Extension Winnebago County website <u>here</u>.

Extension also offers **Rent Smart**, a tenant education series, to assist renters in developing strong relationships with landlords and understand the rights and responsibilities of being a good tenant.

Rent Smart focuses on the knowledge and skills essential for a successful renting experience. **Rent Smart** is designed to help those individuals who have little to no rental experience and those who have had difficulty obtaining rental housing. Successful participants will learn new skills to build positive relationships with landlords and neighbors, gain confidence in their ability to find and maintain affordable housing, understand the application and screening processes used by landlords, and learn the responsibilities and rights of tenants and landlords.

Recent **Rent Smart** participants were asked to name the most important new idea they learned in the program. Their responses included:

- That it is absolutely necessary to pay my rent on time
- Be honest and upfront with the landlord
- What is and isn't legal when it comes to landlord and tenant right
