Foxtails and Pets: Hidden Dangers in the Garden

While lilies and other plants are known to be toxic to pets, <u>Foxtails</u> - a grassy weed with fuzzy seed heads - pose a different kind of risk. These seeds, which appear from spring through fall, have tiny barbs that cling to fur and skin. Once attached, they can burrow into paws, ears, eyes, or under the skin, potentially causing painful infections.

Foxtails are often mistaken for harmless grasses like Timothy grass, bottle brush grass, or ornamental fountain grasses. The key difference? **Foxtail seeds shed easily and feel sharp**, where as lookalikes stay attached and are safe to touch.

Pet Safety Tips:

- Learn to identify foxtails and remove them before they go to seed.
- Avoid overgrown areas where they thrive.
- Check your pet's coat, paws, and ears after outdoor play.

A little awareness goes a long way in keeping your furry friends safe and healthy!
