- Please prepare a 30 sec 1 minute "commercial" to introduce yourself,
- summarize your leadership skills and tell us why you would be a good fit
 as a camp counselor. Your commercial should be taken seriously and
 considered as something you would prepare for a job interview. The
 interviewing panel may ask you some questions.
- After the commercials are completed, we will have our first camp counselor meeting where we will discuss camp roles and expectations as well as brainstorm a 2026 camp theme and discuss camp counselor training schedule

The GROUP Interview and first meeting will take place on January 19th from 1PM to 3PM at the James P. Coughlin Center. The group interview/first meeting is MANDATORY.







American Spirit is a Positive Youth Development Institute Youth Empowerment state educational experience.

About 4-H American Spirit -2026 dates are June 19-28, 2026 and July 3-12,2026

The 4-H American Spirit Experience is an opportunity for youth in grades 8-10 to immerse themselves in history and heritage through a 10-day bus journey to the East Coast and Canada. Staff and volunteers plan and facilitate the experience, while youth participants lead content throughout. Participants will increase their knowledge of American history by visiting significant sites and gain unique exposure to diverse cultural experiences and perspectives foundational to our nation. What is Space Camp?

Space Camp is just what you think it is - it's a camp experience where you learn and experience a ton of different aspects about life as an astronaut, working at NASA, and exploring places beyond Earth! Wisconsin 4-H Space Camp participants experience the **Pathfinder Program**. The Pathfinder Program is a 3 day experience where youth participate in a variety of simulated space activities, such as:



- A Simulated Space Mission (including roles at mission control, on the ISS, in a space shuttle, and on the surface of the moon) with a team of other 4-Her's.
- A variety of Space Simulators such as the multi-axis trainer, five degrees of freedom chair, and the space shot.
- Building and launching their own model rocket.
- On-site meals and sleeping habitats simulating a real space training experience.
- Learning all about space exploration and astronaut life in museum tours guided by a Space Camp expert.
- A team quiz bowl where participants test their knowledge against others at the end of camp.

Those are just a few of the activities that youth will experience while at Space Camp. Every activity has an educational purpose with the goal of teaching kids all about space, STEM, and teamwork. All of these activities are done in a team with other 4-H youth and adults from across the state of Wisconsin. Speaking of 4-H, you might be wondering, why does Wisconsin 4-H go to Space Camp every year, when it's something that anyone can do by going there themselves? Well, Wisconsin 4-H Space Camp is more than just Space Camp!

The Wisconsin 4-H Space Camp Experience

Wisconsin 4-H Space Camp is an educational experience where youth from across the state take a bus down to Huntsville, Alabama, for a 4 day journey. Horticulture

Help your yard survive a dry fall and a cold winter!

The past month has been very dry in Winnebago County. We've had only about 1.5 inches of rain in the last four weeks - that's less than half of



what trees and grass need to stay healthy! On top of that, we've had some hot days, even though this time of year we usually see our first frost.

Some rural areas have gotten close to freezing, but cities like Oshkosh stay a little warmer because of buildings and pavement. This means urban trees and lawns are dealing with big swings in temperature. Because of this, without enough water in the soil, plants are more likely to get damaged when winter hits.

To help your trees and lawn stay healthy:

- Keep watering until the ground freezes
- Young trees may need up to 2 inches of water each week
- Water slowly and deeply so it reaches the roots
- Keep mowing your lawn until the grass stops growing
- Only fertilize trees after the leaves fall, or wait until early spring


